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CEO Overview

Nobody who lived through it is ever likely to forget the unprecedented public health emergency that was our reality during 2020.

Concerning reports from China in January led UL Hospitals Group to establish our first committee to monitor the situation and to assess our preparedness for a novel coronavirus, the disease arising from which we only later came to describe as COVID-19.

As the situation deteriorated rapidly in the following weeks, it became clear we were dealing with a once-in-a century pandemic. We watched in horror to see a health system as well-developed as Italy's strain under the pressure of this unknown disease. In Ireland and in the MidWest, we were determined to do all in our power to see no repeat of what was happening in Bergamo.

The wave of anxiety that swept through the population was shared by many of our hospital staff but by the time the first cases presented to the Emergency Department (ED) in University Hospital Limerick (UHL) during the first week of March, we had prepared as well as we could through recruitment, upskilling, retraining and redeployment; acquisition of PPE; expanding critical care surge capacity; expanding our capacity for testing and contact tracing; development of novel means of communicating the rapidly changing guidance; reimagining our clinical space to provide care in segregated Covid and non-Covid streams; and many other measures. UL Hospitals Group pandemic response was co-ordinated through a corporate and clinical governance structure with clear lines of reporting and accountability and our Hospital Crisis Management Team was convened at least once a day during the height of the crisis.

We also fed into the structures supporting the national crisis response and collaborated on the Area Crisis Management Team with Mid West Community Healthcare, the Department of Public Health Mid West, the National Ambulance Service and other partners.

The impact of COVID-19 on our activity during 2020 is clear from the pages of this review. In terms of unscheduled care, presentations to our ED at UHL declined by 8% and at our Injury Units in Ennis, Nenagh and St John's by a combined 10%.

Scheduled care was even more severely impacted by the pandemic and attendances both at outpatient clinics and for inpatient and day case surgery across all six sites fell by approximately 20%. Compliance with public health guidelines and best Infection Prevention & Control (IP&C) practice shrank the available clinical space and reduced efficiencies. Not only did this limit the number of patients we could see but it radically transformed how we worked and trained as practitioners.

How our staff responded will be a matter of enduring pride for me and for UL Hospitals Group. Theatre staff from Ennis, Nenagh and St John's redeployed to support critical care; staff at Croom Orthopaedic Hospital broadened their scope of practice to care for stable medical patients; teams at University Maternity Hospital Limerick managed to maintain 2019 activity levels while ensuring it was one of the few hospitals in the country not to experience an outbreak of COVID-19.

HSE Estates worked wonders during 2020 to complete rapid build emergency works such as new single room bed capacity at UHL and Croom while also delivering on time and within budget longstanding strategic builds such as the 60-bed block at UHL. We were pleased also to realise longstanding projects such as the relocation of Ennis OPD. And in opening the Intermediate Care Facility at the UL Arena we effectively operated a seventh hospital for several months for non-Covid and post-Covid patients.

While we managed at all times to protect emergency and time-critical services, there is no doubt that patients have suffered as a result of the pandemic. Necessary restrictions on visiting have impoverished the life of the hospital for staff and patients alike. Waiting lists for non-Covid patients have increased and initiatives such as the Safety Net agreement with private healthcare providers will continue to be necessary as long as the public health emergency endures.

The pandemic has forced us all to confront important questions of community and what we as individuals can do to look after our fellow citizens. The messages of support and letters of thanks staff have received from our community have kept spirits up during the darkest periods.

Equally valuable has been the widespread compliance with the public health guidelines. As healthcare providers we are acutely aware of the sacrifices individuals and organisations have made to protect essential services. That social solidarity will continue to serve us well into the future as we look to exit the pandemic and honour the memories of those we have lost to this terrible disease.





Operating on a hub-and-spoke system, the centralised critical care facilities at UHL are supported by Model 2 and Model 2S (Specialist) hospitals. We operate on this basis to achieve economies of scale, to allow for a more streamlined and specialised regional service, and to ensure people can still be treated as close to home as possible. Together, these hospitals deliver a range of crucial services and provide a robust, comprehensive healthcare network for our patients across the Midwest.

*Inpatient is a patient who goes into hospital to receive medical or surgical care and stays there one or more nights while they are being treated.

*Day Case is a patient admitted on an elective basis; no overnight stay; admitted and discharged on same day. Patient care that resulted in a birth/delivery is not included in day case capacity figures.

UHL saw 98 new beds coming on stream in 2020. A 60 bed block, as well as 24 and 14 bed blocks, all provide single room en suite facilities designed to help improve patient comfort, safety, privacy and dignity and assist with the management of infection control.

University Hospital Limerick (UHL)

UHL is the largest hospital in the Group, providing emergency and critical care to the region's patients, especially those who require more complex medical and surgical care.



UHL is one of just eight specialist cancer centres in the country.

UHL provides cutting edge surgical and non-surgical healthcare services.



UHL has a dedicated coronary centre treating patients for serious heart attacks, and a thrombolysis centre, providing vital care for acute stroke.



UHL has the only ED in the Midwest, caring for patients 24/7, 365 days a year.

St John's Hospital also cares for more complex surgical patients who require a short hospital stay.

Specialist Maternity and Orthopaedic Services



The Group has two Specialist hospitals, both catering for specific needs in the community, University Maternity Hospital Limerick, and Croom Orthopaedic Hospital, a regional centre of excellence. Croom has been an orthopaedic hospital

since 1956. During the pandemic it accepted its first medical patients in almost 70 years to help manage a surge in non-COVID admissions. As part of the national response to COVID-19, work commenced in Croom in 2020 on the construction of a new 24 bed single room facility and state-of-the- art theatre suite.









New app helps staff deliver best care for diabetes in pregnancy

University Maternity Hospital Limerick (UMHL) is harnessing smartphone technology to help staff deliver the best care for diabetes during pregnancy, with the launch of its new 'Managing Diabetes in Pregnancy' app in January 2020. The creation of the new app, a first for Irish maternity hospitals, has been led by Registered Advanced Midwife Practitioner, Yvonne Moloney, and developed by Appiercom Software Solutions (now Ingenium).



Home Dialysis transforming the lives of chronic kidney disease patients in Midwest

Home dialysis began to transform the lives of chronic kidney disease patients in the Midwest in 2020. At a time when some 85-90% of the 200-220 patients receiving dialysis treatment for chronic kidney failure were doing so 'in-centre' at UHL, making it one of Ireland's busiest haemodialysis services, the hospital's Department of Renal Medicine team promoted home-based dialysis as the best option for patients requiring the treatment.

Our Services



Intermediate Care Facility (ICF) patients benefit from holistic healthcare model

The ICF was opened on the 8 June in the reconfigured main hall of the UL Sport Arena, a fully equipped temporary hospital setting for non COVID-19 or post COVID-19 patients who no longer required acute medical attention, but who could benefit from a holistic, multi-disciplinary approach to their ongoing rehabilitation and support before final discharge.

The 68-bed ICF, which had capacity to scale up to 84 beds, grew out of the collaborative relationship between UL Hospitals Group (ULHG) and the University of Limerick (UL), and was developed as a contingency solution to the patient flow and crowding challenges experienced in the region's hospitals during the pandemic.



Paediatric Cardiology Service established at University Hospital Limerick (UHL)

A paediatric cardiology service was established at UHL in May 2020. Limerick was designated an Area Children's Cardiac Centre under the All-Island Congenital Heart Disease Network. The regional service commenced through the appointment of Dr Rachel Power as consultant paediatrician with a specialist interest in paediatric cardiology. Nurse specialist Georgina Purcell was also appointed to support this significant service development.

Our Services

Increased capacity across UL Hospitals Group in 2020

A number of construction projects were set in motion at ULHG in 2020 for the addition of 98 new beds on the UHL site (including the new 60 bed block at UHL which opened in November 2020 and the 24 and 14 bed blocks, also opened in 2020) and 24 in Croom Orthopaedic Hospital. In addition, in Nenagh Hospital, eight additional beds opened in June 2020 (phase 2 of new medical ward build).

These are all state-of-the-art, en-suite, single rooms for male or female patients, providing



care and treatment for acutely ill patients from admission to discharge. Each ward has been planned out to benefit work practices and maximise infection prevention and control. Planning permission was also submitted in 2020 for building work on a new 96 Bed ward block at UHL.

New lab and swabbing pod boosts UHL COVID-19 testing capacity



COVID-19 testing capacity at UHL was boosted by 70% in 2020, with two new emergency construction projects that formed a significant regional component of the Government's national pandemic strategy.

The works included a swabbing pod for hospital staff and pre-operative patients, completed in October as well as commencement of a purposebuilt COVID-19 laboratory (due for completion in 2021). Costing approximately €4m, the new COVID-19 lab will provide purpose-built areas for the four stages of the polymerase chain reaction (PCR) technique for DNA analysis.

Our Patient Council

The year 2020 promised to be one of considerable activity for the UL Hospitals Group Patient Council. Our 2019 Council review identified a programme of activity aimed at contributing to its role of "patient and family advocate". This, along with the 11-point action plan from the review of the Patient and Public Participation Strategy 2017 - 2020, gave plenty of scope for further embedding the Council in the UL Hospitals Group patient and family care programmes.

Then, COVID-19 struck. Pandemic conditions emerged and created enormous challenges for and new demands on Ireland's health services. The Patient Council acknowledges and expresses its sincere appreciation and admiration for the preparedness of UL Hospitals Group in its battle with this new virulent disease.

For the Patient Council, a year of promised intensive activity was cut short in March with the decision of the hospitals group to cancel all committee meetings in compliance with national health guidelines. It was envisaged that committee meetings and activity would resume only when the battle with the virus was won. However, some Council activity was possible through video calls and with a small number of in-person meetings during periods of easing of restrictions.

The Patient Council sought a term extension to the end of 2021 in anticipation of its programme of activity being curtailed and to plan for a new Council for 2022. Public membership was increased to enable the Council to respond better to requests from hospital sites for public members. It was encouraging that PALS managers numbers were increased to three, enabling better responses to family concerns about patients especially during these pandemic times.

An outcome from our 11- point action plan concerned about pressure on PALS managers even before COVID-19.

Regular comprehensive reports from UL Hospitals Group CEO Colette Cowan began in March and continued throughout the year. The Council wishes to record its appreciation for the detail in the reports especially having regard to the hospital's challenges of COVID-19 and teams' efforts to maintain limited regular inpatient and outpatient services.

Considering all that has happened during 2020, it is a further great achievement that the new 60 bed unit was operating at near full capacity by year end, and that the new 96 bed unit at UHL was also making progress. New building projects at Croom Orthopaedic Hospital, and extensions at Nenagh and Ennis were progressing. These new facilities will enable expanding of existing and provide new dedicated on-site services. This is a particularly notable achievement against the background of COVID-19

On this challenging and special occasion, I wish to acknowledge and thank all UL Hospitals Group Patient Council members for their interest and commitment during 2020. It is very encouraging and rewarding to be amongst a highly committed and dedicated group (public and staff) of people freely giving of their time. On behalf of the Council, I wish to note the sad death of our esteemed colleague and friend Donal O'Brien.
